FROM THE GROUP SCOUT LEADER

Hello and Welcome to the Group Scout Leader's review March 2021 to February 2022.

As Group Scout Leader my role is to enable Scouting to support your young people to learn through fun and friendship to make the best of their opportunities. This can only be achieved with a fantastic team and my deepest thanks go to the uniformed and non-uniformed members of this Scout Group. Adapting to the changes and the pressure of the last two years has been huge.

In March 2021 we were still in 'red' – Covid lockdown, no face-to-face meetings. We had a virtual St. George's Day and A.G.M. but the upside was that we met online with people we would never have known otherwise. The Scout Association provided every Group in the Country with a licence to Zoom and then policed the software to protect us all – SO grateful. Lockdown all seems so long ago now, but as late as June 2021 we had to cancel meetings due to an upsurge in the pandemic locally. We were all exhausted by the school summer holidays.

Half of our young members lost touch during the year and we resumed face-to-face meetings with only two third of the Groups' previous membership. Several adults were not able to Zoom and a few have now stepped away from Scouting. Always so very grateful for the times they have supported the Group.

It took a while to 'get going' again in September 2021, but to lift us all we had our traditional Group Winter Event. We have a Partnership Agreement with Sir Ranulph Fiennes (SRF) Explorer Scout Unit, so although they are not part of this Group, we work closely so that young members are completely comfortable to move on in their Scouting when they reach 14 years of age. The SRF Leaders organised the Winter Event and it was a huge success, thanks to the fantastic team of adults.

All three Group sections then continued to run weekly meetings. The planning and preparation that goes into our weekly meetings means that if your child/ren attend regularly they have every chance of achieving their Chief Scout Award – the framework and measure by which we are judged. In March this year 3 of our Beavers and 4 of our Cubs respectively earned their Bronze and Silver Chief Scout Awards. This was a major achievement particularly through lockdowns. So, please, make every attempt to support as many meetings, activities and camps as is possible – it is why you all joined, I think...

So, we ended the 2021-2022 year smaller but healthy. Our team of adults is working extra hard juggling family, work, education and Scouts and I am sure I speak for all of us when I say that we are VERY grateful to all. They will say that skills are learned, shared, and a great time is had by all and the bonus is seeing young people flourish in a safe, enjoyable place. This team is human and very amazing! My thanks also to the parents who support as 'occasional helpers'; they enable us to take the children out when otherwise we would not have sufficient adult cover.

Recently a few of our adult team became instructors at tomahawk throwing – no young people were injured! So, if you thought it was all commitment and there is no fun for the adults, think again. If you ever thought you would like to get involved – now is definitely the right time!

Thank you for reading this, and now, please continue to walk, talk and work with us.

We all enjoyed the wonderful evening at Stanford for bonfire night with fireworks, campfire and food and drink. January and we dealt with community care, healthy us, hearing awareness week, made pancakes which went down a treat.

Despite the lockdown we have had several cubs who have achieved their Silver Chief Scout Award and it was great to see this.

I do want to say a big thank you to my fellow leaders and young leaders who have helped out throughout these trying times and pleased that we are now able to run our evenings without any restrictions.

We had a Jamboree selection weekend where eligible scouts were pitched against each other to see who would be selected to attend the World Jamboree in South Korea in 2023 – sadly we did not have a scout selected but it was great to see the skills that scouts had learnt whilst with us being put to use without adult instruction – a true test of scouting.

The troop has also unleashed an artistic side over the year with seasonal pumpkin carving, spooky cake decorating and an art evening where they all painted a landscape in the grounds of RHH whilst listening to music provided by DJ Kayleigh.

The Scouts in the troop have been an absolute pleasure since we started back – I think they missed us as much as we missed them!

EXPLORER SECTION

SRF Explorer unit is one of 4 main Explorer units in Crawley with around 20 members and 5 leaders. Each Explorer unit is part of the Crawley District Scouting setup and therefore not directly part of any group, however, each unit is affiliated with a group. SRF does not only partner with Southgate for use of the grounds and equipment, we work closely together at activities and events throughout the year. Many of the leaders with roles at SRF are also closely involved in 1st Southgate with various roles across the group.

SRF gets its members mainly by Scouts turning 14. Our main intakes are from 1st Southgate Scouts and 7th Crawley Scouts however we have also taken Scouts from other groups in Crawley and brought in young people who have never been involved in Scouting in any capacity before. This has been achieved either through advertising or encouraging current members to bring along their friends. This large mix of members is one of SRF's greatest strengths, the young people all have very different skills and experiences that they are able to share with each other.

Although at times in the past year programme planning has been tough with the constant changes in restrictions, we have still provided a huge range of activities from cooking to laser tag. The Explorers have also had the opportunity to learn so many new skills including navigation, climbing, tomahawk throwing, archery, fire lighting, shooting and badminton. The unit also went on its first post-covid weekend camp in November last year as well as a camp just a few weeks ago helping to restore a nature trail to our local Stanford camp site. Later on this year most of our unit will also be attending Kent International Jamboree with around 5000 other scouts for a whole week of activities and entertainment.
