FROM THE GROUP SCOUT LEADER

Hello and Welcome to the Group Scout Leader's review of the year from March 2022 to February 2023. As you may know, my role as Group Scout Leader is to support our volunteers to use Scouting to encourage your young people to achieve their potential. #Skills for Life as they say! This can only be achieved with a fantastic team and my deepest thanks go to the uniformed and non-uniformed volunteers of this Scout Group.

At the start of this 2022/23 year, I think we all thought that Covid had mostly passed and we would be able to get back to normal. It turns out that 'normal' is no longer with us, at least not recognisable. Scouting has morphed into something new and fit for current times and new challenges. Young people and adults alike in society have struggled to get back to learning, sharing, being considerate and kind to others. All of this needs us to work together and trust in the knowledge that what we are doing is right. Scouting is at its best when we all come together, work as teams and enjoy doing what we do.

At least 4 times a year this Group arranges events when we ALL get together; The Winter Event, St. George's Day, the Group AGM and Group Camp. KarenP, James and Aaron have all stepped back but stayed in touch. Thankfully we were able to recruit Tracy and Darren and other members of the team have supported each other throughout the Group. We truly have an OUTSTANDING team. Thank you all very much.

One of Scouting's strengths is to encourage adults to gain new skills and train to share as instructors. This Group is again blessed to have such a skilled team; We have 8 adults experienced and trained to be able to take young people on Nights Away (sleepovers, camping and expeditions); to instruct in rifle shooting, archery, angel throwing (like tomahawks) and access to so much more. Our young people are so very lucky to have all this within their reach.

Scouting HQ judges the success of a Scout Group by how many Chief Scout's Awards the young people achieve. We do exceptionally well at this, however, to spend time in any of the meetings with the Beavers, Cubs, Scouts or Explorers will always make anyone smile and remember exactly why we are Scouts.

We leave this year 2022/23 smaller than previous years but growing in strength. Scouting is also in 'transition' which will hopefully blow away any remnants of stuffy old-fashioned attitudes (not that there are any in this Group!). CUBS SECTION

Throughout the year we try to provide a varied programme of activities and our evenings have included pancake day explaining the meaning, making and eating them and then pancake races. Scijam which was an evening about science experiments including planting, ocean currents and depths and making LED greetings cards. Learning about St Patrick's day, Mother's day including games and they made flower pot cards, made bug hotels for the hut grounds, athletics evening, international evening, healthy us, personal safety, problem solving, learning about recycling and making a robot from recycled materials, first aid, learning about the countryside rules.

We had Courtney from 7th Crawley join us to run the Scouts of the World Award, the first week involved Food for Thought which taught the Cubs about food waste and carbon emissions, the second week was about Good Life Goals explaining sustainable development goals. She had the Cubs thinking and were great sessions and the Cubs were really well behaved for them.

We have had two outings during the year. The first was to Three Bridges Railway Station where they learnt about the goings on at the station and had a ride on a train, we also had a visit to Crawley Fire station where unfortunately both fire engines had to leave on a shout. They were soon back as the incident was not too serious and they were not required and came back to carry on with the evening.

The Cubs had an overnight camp in April at our hut organised by Jacala and a two night camp at Stanford in June where the Beavers joined us for part of the day to see what happens at camp. Then in September we had a group camp at Stanford which the Cubs, Scouts and Explorers took part in and joined by the Beavers overnight on the Saturday. We were very lucky with the weather each time and had a great time on each occasion.

We have had many joint evenings with the Beavers so that they get to know the Cubs before they move on up. We made easter nests and chicks and had easter related games, went to Lazer World, water games and water fight night, incident hike ending up with chips, Halloween party, and Christmas party. It is always good to see the two sections getting together.

The Cubs were able to participate in the Cub Conker competition and the District Craft Day where they were able to take part in many crafty activities.

During this busy year the Cubs, without realising it, were able to gain many badges culminating in seven Cubs achieving their Silver Chief Scout's Award. Congratulations to Harry, Eloise, Alexander, Shanaya, Arthur, Isabel and Seth.

Several of our scouts undertook the Expedition Challenge back in February and were a great representation of the Troop with regards to planning, participating and completing the badge requirements. They worked hard and well as a team on the weekend and truly showed great scouting skills.

The leadership team has seen a few changes as well – we have gained 2 brilliant Young Leaders Nathan and Chloe who help to bring the programme to the Scouts. Sadly, we have lost Zoe (Jacala) as she has moved away from the area but she has promised to visit and come on camps when possible. We wish her every success at her new job at Gilwell – the home of UK Scouting.

We will be shortly welcoming Elliot to the team. He has been assisting at Explorers but his work/ study commitments have changed so he will now be joining us at Scouts.

The Scouts have all been working hard on their badges over the year and I would like to thank all the parents and families for their support to help the Scouts achieve this and to thank the leaders in the team for their enthusiasm for delivering a wide and varied programme – this year the scouts have earnt an impressive <u>186 badges</u> between them.

Our 2 original Patrol leaders William and Jacob have been a credit to the troop and at the time of finishing writing this, I am just waiting for a report on their volunteering day before they have completed their Gold Chief Scout's Award. They have worked so hard to achieve this – especially as it normally takes 3 years to achieve this and they have done it in 2 (due to a certain virus that shut down the world!) We are now looking forward to camping in June as a troop at Stanford and our joint Summer Camp at Ferny Crofts with 7th Crawley and 1st Langley Green in August.

EXPLORER SECTION

SRF Explorer unit is one of 4 main Explorer units in Crawley with around 20 members and 5 leaders. Each Explorer unit is part of the Crawley District Scouting setup and therefore not directly part of any group, however, each unit is affiliated with a group. SRF does not only partner with Southgate for use of the grounds and equipment, we work closely together at activities and events throughout the year. All of the leaders with roles at SRF are also closely involved in 1st Southgate with various roles across the group.

SRF is fed mainly by Scouts turning 14. Our main intakes are from 1st Southgate Scouts and 7th Crawley Scouts however we have also taken Scouts from other groups in Crawley and brought in young people who have never been involved in Scouting in any capacity before. This has been achieved either through advertising or encouraging current members to bring along their friends. This large mix of members is one of SRF's greatest strengths, the young people all have very different skills and experiences that they are able to share with each other.

During the last year the number of young people in SRF has remained steady in the low – mid twenties. On the other hand, the number of leaders has decreased to two regular leaders. This has led to a couple of meeting cancellations and we are currently trying to increase the number of leaders. Any help is always welcome! During 2022 SRF went on a weekend camp in the spring, attended KIJ, a week-long Jamboree in Kent and joined 1st Southgate for group camp in September. Our weekly meetings in 2022 were varied, ranging from the annual ex-members reunion, all the way to navigation badges and night hikes. In addition, we held a number of additional events including our annual Christmas dinner. 2023 has got off to a great start with a varied programme that included attending the annual London Monopoly Run. Hopefully this great start to the year continues with our annual spring camp in May.
